Course Title: Kyoto: The Past in the Present

Instructor: H. Smith

Course Description:

This course explores Kyoto from many angles, as a way of getting all of us to observe and

experience the city directly, and to think about the changing connections between past and

present. Each assignment requires you both to explore on your own and to visit particular

places, always asking questions from Japanese whom you encounter. Among the topics of

exploration are: nature in the city; the Kyoto street plan; the survival of Genji monogatari in

Kyoto; traces of Hideyoshi; Raku tea ceramics; Buddhist cemeteries; neighborhood Jizo

shrines; local festivals; pubic baths; and the Biwako Canal. The emphasis of the course is on

direct personal exploration of the city today in order to grasp its long and complex history.

Requirements:

1) Regular class attendance, with careful preparation and thoughtful participation in

class discussion. (Counts for one-third of grade)

2) Participation in projects, either alone or as the member of a team, to create

web-based studies of key topics related to the history of Kyoto as it can be

experienced today. (Counts for two-thirds of grade)
